The Royal Solent Yacht Club (the 'Club') has carried out this risk assessment of the Club's sailing activities to satisfy the requirements of Regulation 3 of the Management of Health and Safety at Work Regulations 1999. It has been carried out in direct response to the requirements of organisations to Covid 19 some of which is outlined in law.

The Club's sailing activities involve competitors, RIB drivers and crew, Race Officers, Club staff and helpers. Separate Risk Assessments have been carried out for the particular issues presented on the Committee Boats and in Grants due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Government COVID-19 advice must be followed, particularly with regard to social distancing. This guidance changes and it is the responsibility of each individual to ensure that they are familiar with it, over-riding this risk assessment if necessary. Competitors, rib drivers and crew and helpers must be conservative and be mindful of others. The risk assessment will be reviewed and updated as guidance or requirements change.

Organised sport participation events such as Regattas and Club racing can take place outdoors and are exempt from legal gathering limits. Events run by the Club comply with the 'RYA Guidance on Sailing and Racing with Participants from Different Households during Covid -19 in England'. This RYA Guidance recognises that in some situations whilst afloat it will not be possible to maintain normal social distancing, helps skippers and participants to evaluate the risk and suggests some mitigations that may need to be implemented. Sailors should read this RYA Guidance.

No one may participate in racing unless they have completed fully the Club's Condition of Entry forms and they have read and understood this Risk Assessment. Competitors may have their temperatures taken electronically prior to sailing. Sailing is by its nature an unpredictable sport and

therefore inherently involves an element of risk. This activity is for competent people capable of making their own decisions and sailing without support from others. The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in the activity is hers alone.
