35/24 Approval of Minutes from 28th March 2024 Meeting The minutes were approved as a true record.

37/24 Commodore's Update

Director Obligations. Rudi Fortson had kindly prepared a document in relation to the duties of a director, which had been shared with the GC in advance of the meeting and which all present were happy with. Mark Lacey responded that he may not have received it and enquired whether directors have any financial obligations and whether insurance covered that? The Commodore passed him a hard copy of the document and advised him to come back with any enduring queries.

South Sheds. Quotes are still awaited from a number of builders; with the current lack of funding the work isn't urgent and will start with the Club store in the south east corner adjacent to the new workshop. The YOD Class has said that it will raise funds if it can be guaranteed usage of the refurbished sheds in the winter.

Member Complaint. The Commodore is awaiting a further response from the complainant, Ian Hornblow, regarding the Commodore's suggestion of more a generic apology. It was re-iterated to Mr Hornblow that the subject of the conversation was not relevant, the complaint focused on his aggressiveness and use of the F word. If Mr Hornblow is not willing to submit a generic apology, the Commodore will confer with appropriately qualified people to avoid escalating the matter and to ensure the next step is based on what is best for the Club.

Nigel Hawkes' Bar Suggestion. Following the suggestion by Nigel Hawkes at the AGM to reduce the space behind the bar in order to increase the space in front of the bar at the pinch point, it was generally agreed that the space behind the bar is needed to accommodate staff using the glass washer and sink which are situated there, plus there are no funds to re-design the bar at this time. 38/24 Financial Report by Hon. Treasurer

March Results. At the end of the first quarter the figures are looking rather good. The year-to-date deficit of (£54.6k) is worse than last year, however last year the Club RIB was sold for £9.5k so without this additional income the figures are comparable year on year. Bar and catering are the star performers, the bar margin is at 69% and has recovered well since February when it was at 63%. Year to date it is 65.5% which is up on last year's margin of 62.7% and up on the budget of 62%. Catering is also at 69% for March and 65.5% for the year

to date, which is up on last year, though slightly down on the budgeted 67%. The Hon. Treasurer is closely monitoring margins and is happy with their progress. The position at the end of the first quarter forms a good platform as we head into the busier months. The Hon. Treasurer will review the budget but doesn't anticipate making any changes. The cash flow position is still in good shape.

Boat Fund. The Club's auditors, Harrison Black, have confirmed that money can be moved into the boat fund based on depreciation, though there is some feeling that fundraising would be preferable to using our capital. The Vice Commodore's Committee recommends all for approval to the GC. All present approved the applications which were proposed by the Commodore and seconded by RCH.

Talan Skeels-Piggins. Talan thanks GC for how award of Honorary Life Membership. He has said that he will display the RSYC burgee and Blue Ensign as he sails around Britain and Ireland. He has also said that he would be delighted to give a talk to RSYC Members on his adventures when he has completed his trip. The Secretary added that she will suggest to Hatch Mansfield that the Taittinger regatta charity prize draw could support the charities that Talan's round Britain trip is fundraising for (Disabled Sailors Association, Hilary's Dream Trust and BLESMA), if they be happy with this. (Post meeting – Hatch Mansfield agreed to this proposal).

Green Working Group - Achelous Hydrokinetic Trials. Achelous have presented their initial report on their trial during recent Spring tides which has been provided to GC. The maximum flow recorded over 24 hours was 1.15m/s (2.23 knots) with an average flow of 0.27m/s (0.52 knots). A flow of over 0.3ms is the minimum required to drive the turbine and the water flow speed at the jetty was above 0.3m/s for around 40% of the time. Achelous said the power that would be generated would drive the jetty lights but no more than that.

The VCC held a conference call with Achelous on 24th April to discuss the initial report and proposed next steps. Outputs of meeting of 24th April & Next Steps:

- Discussed with Achelous the possibility of trialling the unit at the farthest outhaul post. They said that the tide was visibly stronger there.
- Discussed the possibility of trialling using a swing mooring.

We are now in the main sailing season, so we need to give careful thought to both these options.

- Achelous to test their rig at their lab using batteries rather than mains power to assess the life. If this works suitably well then there is no need to run power cables to the unit for the purposes of a trial.
- In the longer term, we would need to consider implications for permissions should we install a permanent unit.
- Once the battery tests have concluded, Achelous to write to RSYC with their proposals for the next set of tests – Outhaul Post and possibly using a Swing Mooring.

Open Day, Saturday 4th May. Lesley Tregear and Jane Roberts have the Preparations are in hand. A sufficient number of volunteers had made themselves available. Thank you to those who have volunteered to assist. In order to follow sufficiently robust due diligence on membership applications, the VCC agreed, as was the case last year, that prospective members without a proposer or seconder when they attend Open Day must be interviewed by a Flag Officer, or a member of GC or VCC who should in-turn be the proposer or seconder.

Towers Party 2024. This year's Towers Party will support Cure Parkinson's and Motor Neurone Disease Association.

- RNLI Ball, 11th May – hosting dinner for up to 160 so all staff are stepping up to work it, tickets are almost sold out.

- Gin Tasting Night on 8th June by The Isle of Wight Gin Company.

Outside Events. As the Secretary will expand on shortly, there have been a number of large outside events, all of which have a positive impact on profit and turnover. The first quarter is always the quietest, so we are right on target.

NYE Party. At a previous GC meeting the GC approved a recommendation by the House Committee that the Club should hold a three-course brunch on New Year's Eve this year instead of the usual party. This was proposed for one year only due to the success of the Christmas Eve brunch and the fact that the last NYE party, although contributing a profit, was not as well attended and the atmosphere was felt to be flat. Some negative feedback had been received from a few members and one House Committee member had since changed their mind, but RCH feels that the committees should stick to this decision and would appreciate everyone's support on this. All present were in agreement. Peter Crowhurst agreed that it was good to take the opportunity to offer something different for a change but stressed that advanced pre-marketing of any signature event is important.

41/24 Update from Rear Commodore Sailing

Sailing. The Spring Series has now finished, 11 boats turned out and 5 races out of 7 were run, with 2 lost due to the weather, which is not a bad result. The Dayboats have now gone in the water and on the Club moorings and the Wednesday Evening Series started this week. Sadly, there wasn't enough wind and all the boats were DNF, but quite a few went out which bodes well for the season ahead. The Laser class is talking about racing on Sundays. The Contessa Regatta now has 21 entries, the 26s have their nationals but more need to be encouraged to enter and RCS is confident they will as they enjoyed it last year. Taittinger entries opened with a bang and there are already 82 entries, a quarter of the usual total were received in 2 days. Eight new VHF radios

have been ordered as it is a cost saving on hiring them every year for the Taittinger Regatta. The Cruiser Challenge takes place tomorrow, in which the racing cruisers go out and encourage others to join in a pursuit race.

Cruising. The Cruising Group's trip to Gins Farm was unfortunately cancelled as the premises was flooded earlier last month. The next trip is to the Royal Victoria Yacht Club in Fishbourne in 2 weeks time, which is also accessible via car.

Club Boats. The Club boats are in the water and ready, though Countdown needs a lick of paint on her topsides. A new depth gauge has now been added to Solent RIB and Marksman's depth gauge has been tested. It is planned to hold monthly meetings about the Club boats with the Secretary, Head Boatman, Richard Pierrepont and RCS in order to get a clear structure and better communication in place for maintenance work out of season. This will ensure everyone knows what's coming in terms of work and maintenance and the yard knows what parts to order. Hamish Fletcher suggested looking at getting a temporary structure to enable work on the boats to continue in any weather.

Arthur Farley. Last Friday, Olympic hopeful Arthur Farley gave a talk with the aim of attracting support and funding for his Olympic bid, which requires £50k a year at least. Young sailors and their parents from YSC were invited to attend and around 14 came, plus the bar was full for happy hour so it turned out to be a great evening with the youngsters enjoying the Club and in awe of a young future Olympian. Stephen Hucklesby invited Arthur to race with him on Sundays, which he is now doing, and also kindly donated £1k to his Olympic campaign.

42/24 Secretary's Points

Outside Events. There are 61 outside events booked so far this year, with 10 in May and 13 in June. Many groups are repeat visitors and there are also several significant functions such as the Needles Masonic Lodge Dinner in April for 99 guests, the RNLI Gala Ball for 160 in May, IDOR Regatta Dinner for 100+ in June and a charity ball for 160 in September. (These are listed in pink font alongside member events (green font) in the Events Calendar within the Committee Area on the Club's website).

Membership Statistics. Total membership, not including those approved today, stands at 1062 compared to 1028 at the same point last year, which is an increase year on year of 34 members. New & re-instated members this year are 26 compared to 22 last year. Hamish Fletcher enquired as to how many members had yet to pay their subscriptions and the Secretary responded that there were no outstanding subscriptions due.

Staffing Update. Further to the email to the membership, Brooke's last day will be on Saturday 18th May. Danielle has been promoted to take over from Brooke under the title House Manager. Stuart has received a promotion to Bar Steward so that he can better support Matt in matters such as training and procedures. Will Marsh has started in the role of Assistant Boatman and recruitment is underway for a Summer Boatman.

Mark Lacey asked why so many staff seem to be leaving? The Secretary responded that Brooke has been at the Club 10 years and now feels it is time to move on to a role with a better work/life balance. Two other part time front of house staff left as they had received job offers in areas other than hospitality which suited them better. So, in short, recent resignations have been for personal reasons rather than any issues with the Club.
